SEVACE Honors Coach Rabbit Howard BELOVED COACH OF PORTSMOUTH AND CHESAPEAKE

They called Ernest Howard's father "Big Rabbit" and his son Hare. That's how fast they were on the basketball court and baseball diamond. But it was on the sidelines where the younger Howard, known as just Rabbit

by then, made a name for himself.

First in Danville and then at Portsmouth Catholic, Churchland, and Western Branch, the Portsmouth native led his high school squads to well over 200 wins. "When my Catholic team beat Wilson 48-47 back in 1963, it was the most famous upset in the school's history," he recalls. Not bad for a private academy with just 78 students.

Rabbit knew how to coach basketball because he

had played it. Not so much golf, but he took on that challenge too, coaching squads to 300 match wins in 23 years. "What makes me really happy is how many of my players continue to stay in touch with me," says the legendary leader, who turns 93 in January. Other frequent visitors to Bickford Manor Assisted Living in Suffolk, where Rabbit is easily the most popular resident, include his two daughters, three grandchildren

and four great grandchildren, the apples of his eye. Now Rabbit's fans have done something else, establishing a fund in his name at the Southeast Virginia Community Foundation to help student

> athletes in need of financial assistance. It was the highlight of a reception, held naturally at a golf course, Elizabeth Manor Country Club, with \$150,000 and continues to grow. "It's success is no secret to me," says his grandson Trey Cooper, a basketball and soccer standout at Norfolk Collegiate and soccer player at Hampden Sydney, who worked closely with retired judge Mo Whitlow, former Portsmouth treasurer Iimmy Williams and Richard Wentz at the Foundation to start the

fund. "The community just loved my grandfather and obviously still does. It's wonderful that his legacy will continue to assist athletes for years to come."

Benjamin Goldberg Foundation Brings Healing Arts to Children



Benjamin Goldberg was five when diagnosed with Neuroblastoma, a rare cancer of the nervous system. Benjamin endured his difficult treatment by using music as a source of healing. He wore special headphones to walk the floors of the hospital to bring calm to his turbulent world. "He was his own little beam of light," says his mother, Wendy Goldberg.

Benjamin sadly passed away in 2016 at the age of eight. Inspired by her son, Wendy volunteered at CHKD and created the Benjamin Goldberg Foundation to bring the healing arts to children, their families, and caregivers by providing creative engagement that supports health, healing and well-being.

During COVID, the foundation went virtual, and thanks to grants from SEVACF, the Peace Out Portal on the website continues to provide free and easy access to music, art, movement and mind/body resources. Engaging videos help patients, caregivers and healthcare workers incorporate the healing arts during their medical journeys. "We wanted to be the bridge between the hospital and the home," says Wendy.

"I was vocal about bringing the healing arts into the hospital," she adds. "The music did not change the outcome, but it did change our story and our experience. Ben's essence is alive, and his spirit lives on."

"SEVACF has been pivotal in growing the Peace Out Portal while coming out of the pandemic. Thank you SEVACF for helping make this a reality."


SUPPORT SEVACE'S HERITAGE FUND
